GUIDANCE TO WALKERS

Please remember that the walk is about 10 miles long and at times the route is rough and steep. The whole event lasts about nine hours. You must be reasonably fit and healthy and dressed appropriately for the weather. Boots or stout walking shoes should be worn.

The marshals (wearing yellow hi-visibility jackets) are there to help you and keep you safe. Please follow their instructions especially at road crossings. The walk leader will be wearing an orange hi-visibility jacket.

A lunch stop will be taken at Cefn Farm. Drinks are provided. Please bring your own picnic lunch.

- 1. Walkers participate at their own risk
- 2. No unaccompanied children. All children under 16 must be accompanied by a responsible adult.
- 3. No dogs except guide dogs.
- 4. Please observe any instructions from the walk marshals. Do not get ahead of the walk leader.
- 5. The walk passes over private properties. Please respect the privacy and property of the landowners who have kindly given permission for the walk:
 - Take home your rubbish or leave in the bins provided
 - Take care not to damage hedges and fences
 - Take care not to disturb any livestock
 - Keep to the route to avoid damaging any crops
- 6. Take care at road crossings. Obey any instructions from the marshals. Marshals are there to warn and protect you, not to stop the traffic.
- 7. When walking along roads keep to the left and walk no more than two abreast, use a pavement if available.
- 8. Part of the route is along the beach. Follow the marshals' instructions. Keep out of the sea.
- 9. Some walkers go under Pont y Brenin at Llangoed. This is entirely voluntary and is at your own risk.
- The Town Council reserves the right to exclude from the walk anyone who is behaving badly, putting their own safety at risk or endangering the enjoyment and safety of the event.

In case of emergency contact the walk leader or any walk marshall.



BEATING THE BOUNDS 26 MAY 2014

For hundreds of years the citizens of Beaumaris have perambulated the town boundary to assert the rights and privileges of the town and community. As the Elizabethan charter of 1562 puts it: "it shall be lawful to the Mayor, Baliffs and Burgesses of the Borough to make a presentation or perambulations of it to know superintend and limit their liberties and franchises around, within and without the borough".

Much has changed since then. We no longer beat the local boys to make sure that they remember the town limits or cast down any walls and hedges that encroach on the boundary. But ceremonies such as throwing a stone into the sea or crowning the 'Queen' at Gorslwyd provide a tangible link with our history and the traditions of the past. Beating the Bounds is now an enjoyable family day out. We may not need to claim the town boundary any more, but by walking together around the town we reinforce the sense of community that makes Beaumaris so special.
